The month of October continues. Each year this month is dedicated to the Most Holy Rosary. This is primarily due to the fact that the liturgical memorial of Our Lady of the Rosary is celebrated annually during this month on October 7. This memorial was instituted to honor the Blessed Virgin Mary in gratitude for the protection that she gives the Church and her spiritual children in answer to the praying of the Rosary by the faithful.




The memorial was introduced by Pope St. Pius V in

the year 1571 to commemorate the miraculous victory of the Christian forces in the Battle of Lepanto on October 7, 1571. The Pope attributed more to the "arms" of the Rosary than to the power of cannons and the valor of the soldiers who fought there.

In this month of October, let us consider this beautiful prayer of the Rosary as a means that we, too, can use

in order to draw closer to Jesus and Mary by meditating on the great mysteries of our salvation.



Registering as a Parishioner

Why is it so important register with a parish? Registration is the official way we join a parish community.

Some people think that because they attend a particu-

lar parish they automatically belong. Registering as parishioners requires signing up, formally enrolling yourself in a parish by contacting the parish business office. Registration is a commitment to a community, a way to be included in the religious, social and ministerial activities of your parish. Registration shows you belong. It is also necessary for certain benefits and administrative purposes, like scheduling sacraments, obtaining a sponsor or godparent eligibility and qualification letter from the pastor, and getting donation statements for your income tax returns. Most importantly, it lets the parish count on you, to call on you to assist in its mission. Registering in your parish is a statement of faith and confidence in the life and work of your parish and of the Church. All Saints Day

Reminder: All Saints Day Is NOT a **Holy Day of Obligation This Year**

The Solemnity of All Saints (celebrated annually on November 1) is ordinarily a "holy day of obligation" requiring attendance and participation at Mass on that day. However, November 1 this year falls on a Saturday and so the obligation to attend Mass that day is "abrogated" or lifted in the United States. Even so, all faithful who are able to attend Mass on November 1 are still invited and strongly encouraged to do so or to join the universal Church by celebrating this important solemnity through prayer.

The Sacrament of Holy Matrimony

Jesus elevated marriage to a Sacrament at the Wedding Feast at Cana. Catholics have the duty to receive the Sacrament of Matrimony in a Catholic church. The Grace of the Sacrament of Matrimony enhances and supports the permanent and indissoluble bond of marriage and strengthens the love and fidelity, patience and wisdom of the spouses.



Please make contact with the parish office at least one year prior to your intended marriage date to begin the preparation process. This includes attendance at a Pre-Cana Conference and several meetings with one of our parish priests. A specific wedding date cannot be assured by the parish until *after* this marriage preparation has commenced and initial documentation has been received and reviewed. Therefore, all engaged couples are strongly advised to *speak to the parish staff first* when beginning to make wedding plans and *strongly advised not to make commitments with third-parties* (banquet halls, photographers, hotels, airlines, etc.) until *after* the wedding date has been finalized in writing with the parish office.

If you are presently in a civil marriage and desire to receive the Sacrament and enter into a valid Catholic marriage, please contact the parish office at 732-222-8080 to obtain further information about the "convalidation" of your marriage. We also offer direction and assistance on the possibility of receiving an annulment for those who are divorced. Please do not hesitate to call. The annulment process is generally less difficult or cumbersome than imagined.

<u>Pastor's Note.</u> <u>October</u> is the <u>Month of the Holy Rosary</u> as well as <u>Respect Life Month</u>. In our parish bulletin this week and during the weeks of October we have been including important teachings and writings of the Church on both of those subjects. That series began two weeks ago with information on the graces and benefits that are obtainable from the praying of the Rosary. Last week the series addressed the origin and history of the Rosary and the power of this prayer. Please pray the Rosary frequently if not daily. The series continues this week with a teaching document written in September 2020 by our Bishop, His Excellency David M. O'Connell, C.M., to help us to know and understand more fully and to live-out more effectively the teaching of our Church on respect for human life (especially the lives of the most vulnerable in the womb) and the sinfulness of abortion. Please continue to pray for the end of abortion; for conversion, reconciliation, and healing; and for competent and compassionate care and support for women during pregnancy and thereafter. Our Lady of the Holy Rosary, pray for us. Our Lady of Guadalupe, Patroness of the Unborn, pray for us.

Please!!! May We All Respect Life!!!

I am convinced, after 66 plus years on this earth, that all of the problems impacting us in this world of ours derive from a single root cause: the failure to "respect life in all its stages, from conception to natural death."

Abortion, euthanasia, capital punishment; acts of terror and war; escalating crime; violence and wanton killing of innocents; domestic and sexual abuse; drugs and gang crimes; the immigration crisis; poverty and inequality; discrimination and injustice; racism and hatred; breakdown of the family; blatant disregard for the environment — these are all "life issues" because they tear at the most basic obligation of every human: to respect life. Think about it for a moment.

Of all these failures to respect life, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops have declared that the threat of abortion remains "our preeminent priority" be-

important as ever, for just as the Supreme Court may allow greater latitude for state laws restricting abortion, state legislators have passed statutes not only keeping abortion legal through all nine months of pregnancy but opening the door to infanticide. Additionally, abortion contaminates many other important issues by being inserted into legislation regarding immigration, care for the poor, and health care reform, and so on.

All human life is sacred. The dignity of the human person is the foundation of a moral vision for society. Direct attacks on innocent persons are never morally acceptable, at any stage or in any condition. In our society, human life is especially



under direct attack from abortion, which some political actors mischaracterize as an issue of "women's health." Other direct threats to the sanctity of human life include euthanasia and assisted suicide (sometimes falsely labelled as "death with dignity"), human cloning, in vitro fertilization, and the destruction of human embryos for research.

October 1 this year begins "Respect Life Month," with October 3 designated as "Respect Life Sunday" in the Catholic Church in the United States. Beginning on the weekend, all Catholics are called to celebrate our Church's commitment to respect life in all its stages. the Church invites us all to consider every means at our disposal to advocate on behalf of every human life.

To believe in God as Creator requires that we must believe that God is the author of life, all life, every life. It is not merely the logical conclusion of that belief: it is the only conclusion. And if that is what we believe; if that is the only conclusion that we can derive from our common human experience, how can anyone reasonably not respect life in all its stages?






